Official opening of the court house

On Sunday, March 4 the society is staging a double celebration - the official opening of our new home and its first anniversary in the Old Lilydale Court House.

Yarra Ranges Shire Mayor, Cr Graham Warren will perform the official opening at 2pm. A special guest of the society will be former

councillor Ken Smith and Susie Smith. As a solicitor Mr Smith often appeared at Lilydale Court and he battled the state government to keep the Court sitting in Lilydale but to no avail. When the government closed the court, Mr Smith started the prolonged fight to secure the facility for the community.

He was involved in the negotiations which led to the Shire of Yarra Ranges purchasing the building and preserving the district's oldest civic building.

Grant success

Older members are vital to the community

Catering for 200 primary school children in one day takes some doing but the members of the society took it in their stride.

The grades 1 and 2 and 3 and 4 children from Lilydale Primary School visited the court house as part of their heritage studies.

To cater for such a large groups and their teachers we had members sitting a four tables in the court house and another three at various points in and around Melba park.

Split into groups the children walked to each point and listened as the guides highlighted the points of historical interest. Inside the court house the members had various objects for the children to play with. Members also explained how everything worked as many of the objects the children had not seen or touched before.

Afterwards, the society received 22 letters from the children thanking us for the day and highlighting the things they found interesting.

The children - in no order - liked the butter churn, typewriter, lunch box, washing day, the tannery, the old library, the swimming pool,

the former Methodist Church and the oak tree.

Caitlin's letter was typical:

Dear Sue, Louise, Dot, Phillip, Val. Margaret and Ros,

Thank you for showing the grade 3/4s at Lilydale Primary School the Lilydale Historical Society.

I enjoyed the washing system and the typewriter and I leant that acorn will turn into a tree.

Being on duty at the court house can be a lot of fun as you never know who is going to walk through the door. While everyone was gearing up for the Lilydale Show in late November, a group of children and their teacher landed at the court house.

They were the children of showmen who travel around Australia to attend various shows and festivals. Accompanying them are teachers from the Queensland School for Travelling Show Children. Their teacher explained he and his wife are teachers and they travel with the showmen up and down the country. Usually they have a large semi-trailer which is fitted out as a school room but at Lilydale the number of students was so small, so they just used their caravan and the great outdoors. The children varied in ages but all wanted to know about the building; about the society before going outside to study its architecture and sketch the building.

From Pages Past

Reports from the 1860s

As more and more newspapers are digitised by the National Library through Trove, we are able to access information about our district, previously not readily available.

Below are just two of those items. Note the two different ways Lilydale is spelt.

We understand that the cattle around Lillydale are suffering severely from pleuro- pneumonia. Some of the stock-owners have been compelled to slaughter several head.

(South Bourke Standard (1861-1873) June 2, 1863 pg 2)


A fatal accident occurred on Wednesday morning at the corner of Bourke and Williams streets. It seems that a young man named Isaac Rourke, residing at Lilydale, was following a young horse when he fell off the animal he was riding, and died shortly after he was taken to the hospital.

(South Bourke Standard March 23, 1866).

Isaac Rourke was aged 21 and was the son of Denis and Ann (Bolton) Rourke. He had been in the colony for 15 years. The Lilydale Burial Register records his interment as being on November 10, 1866, seven months after his death. In the column "If burial registered" has been left blank on his Death Certificate. This is probably because while the cemetery site was set aside in 1861 it was not until November 1866 that the appropriate books and plans of the graves and paths was carried out and earlier burials were recorded from that date rather than the burial date.

First lady to sit on the bench at Lilydale

Cr Gwen Hardy was the first local woman to sit on the bench at Lilydale. At the time, many thought she was the first woman to do so. However recent research reveals she was pipped by several decades - 1938:

Concomitant with her annual vacation a visit to the Lilydale police court was made by Mrs Warren, J.P. of Hawthorn, and when the lady justice made her appearance last Friday she was cordially welcomed by Mr C. Hotchkins, J.P., who was supported by Mr D. Eales (for the bar), Senior-constable McIntyre, and Mr Woods (clerk of courts). Mrs Warren who accepted a seat on the Bench, stated in reply that she had had 37 year' experience with children's welfare work.

The day it snowed in Lilydale

On July 19, 1951 Lillydale Shire and Lilydale township was blanketed snow.

The *Lilydale Express* reported on it on page 1 the following week:

Lillydale Shire was blanketed with a heavy and totally unexpected fall of snow last Thursday. The morning dawned much the same as other mornings at this time of the year - cold, but not unusually so, and with murky, lowering skies. Rain set in steadily about 10 o'clock, and if anyone gave it more than a passing thought, such as is customary at the bleak period, it was to say to oneself, "Another miserable day." What was it that happened, then, that caused the skies suddenly at about 11.30 to send down extra large feathery flakes of pristine purity? They fell softly and almost as straight as a die, and they continued their descent until later into the afternoon. Lilydale's main street looked as though it had a coating of opalescent sugar and harassed housewives were accordingly amazed and unbelieving. Melba Park reserve appeared to have been heavily whitewashed the

large open area over the railway gates behind Moulded Products seems seasonably set of ice-capades, and the contiguous branches of the Olinda Creek paddocks and football ground appeared as scenes from Switzerland but with snow-besprinkled gum and weeping willow trees instead of pines. It was all so lovely while it lasted, and strange to say, the temperature seemed milder than when the day began. Snow frolics were extraordinary diversions, snowmen grew surprisingly in most surprising places; and the girls at factories in Main street pelted themselves and those who chanced by with snowballs; and really everybody had a most unusual time. It was a pity, though that the electric light was off on Thursday night for we nearly had to go to bed in the dark. Last time the Snow King called on us here in the township was in August 1932.
