# Society secures a five-year lease on the Old Lilydale Court House

It may have taken months of negotiations but the society has now secured its home for a further five years and hopefully many years beyond 2021.

The new lease agreement sees the society and the U3A who use the facility the same number of days as the society, pay 50/50 on all costs - gas electricity, water and council garbage charges.

In return for the society agreeing to these terms, the shire, recognising the uniqueness of the design of the building with its massive vaulted ceilings, agreed to install at its cost, several energy-reduction devices. These include ceiling fans; blinds on the windows and the removal of the prohibitively expensive electric wall heaters installed throughout the building.

To ensure fairness in the 50/50 split, the shire has upgraded the smart meter and will monitor energy usage.

The shire has also installed a new lock on our front door to increase security; has carried out much needed maintenance of the two outbuildings and given the society permission to erect its own small shed to store items such as tables, chairs and our chair mover.

On behalf of the society I want to specially thank those people from throughout Australia who wrote letters and sent emails to the shire supporting the

# RULES FOR WOMEN TEACHERS 1915

- 1. You will not marry during the term of contract.
- 2. You are not to keep company of men.
- 3. We must be home between the hours of 8pm and 6am, unless attending a school function.
- 4. You may not loiter down town in an ice cream parlours.
- 5. You may not travel beyond the city limits without the permission of the chairman of the board.
- 6. You may not ride in a carriage or automobile with any man, unless he is your father or brother.
- 7. You may not smoke cigarettes.
- 8. You may not dress in bright colours.
- 9. You may not, under any circumstances, dye your hair.
- 10. You must wear at least two petticoats and your dresses must not be any shorter than 5cm (two inches) above your ankle.

When Maree Phelan recently put this article from our archives up on Facebook it quickly generated many shares and comments. One hundred years on thankfully, women have much more freedom.

Note: The conversion to metric - 5cm was done when it was re-typed as so many don't know the length 2 inches.

## Poon Kee - the much loved Lilydale green grocer

It is amazing what can be found when you aren't looking for it.

Secretary Joy Gothe was doing some personal research when she stumbled across the Alien Registration

Application of Poon Kee, one of Lilydale's most popular and well known Chinese residents. And more importantly we now have a photograph of him just a few years before his death.'

Poon Kee became a fixture to the people of Lilydale from early in the 20th century when he arrived at Lilydale in July 1909 and rented his shop from Robert Black.

He set up a green grocer's shop on the south side of Main Street next to the Olinda Creek on the west side. He grew his vegetables behind his shop along John Street and also at other locations such as Gardiner and Anderson streets. Whenever the Olinda Creek flooded which was regularly before the late 1930s, his crops were wiped out.


According to his death certificate he was born in Canton, China the son of Hoong Poon. His mother was unknown. When he was 20, Kee married at Chung War and they had one child Ah Jun Poon who was deceased at the time of Kee's death in 1943. The name of his wife was unknown.

Poon Kee was unwell on Saturday, May 2 and sadly was found dead in his shop by fellow shopkeeper Ern Oliver the following day. Dr McMahon recorded the cause of death as pneumonia which occurred on May 2, 1943. He was 68 years old. He was interred in the Chinese section of the Fawkner Cemetery on May 5.

After his death, his store's produce and worldly goods were gathered up and taken to the Lilydale Police of Australia:
Station where they were auctioned off. The proceeds from the sale paid for his funeral and the rest was sent to his family in

China.

**War Memorial** 

Recently the society was fortunate to receive the donation of the program for the official unveiling of the Lilydale War Memorial in our Main Street in 1922.

This coupled with a photograph from our collection of the actual event is a valuable asset to our collection.

It took many years to raise the funds to build the memorial and of course lots of discussion as to its location.

The memorial was unveiled on Friday, May 19, 1922. On that day, the Lilydale Express wrote:

"Today will be long remembered in Lilydale – as it should be – as it is the day fixed fro the unveiling of the memorial table erected to perpetuate the memory of the brave and noble boys who enlisted to help in the defence of our great Empire, in which Australia is included."The memorial was unveiled by His Excellency the Earl of Stradbroke K.C.M.G, C.B, C.V.O, C.B.E. Governor of Victoria.

The monument consists of a beautiful granite block, mounted on the top of which is the life-sized figure of a


soldier standing at ease holding a rifle. The figure is pure white and contrasts very suitably with the four-sided granite block on which the names of the fallen heroes are inscribed. The names were: G. Allen, E. Atkinson, D. Briers, J.D. Burns, R.J. Chauvin, E.A. Duncan, T.W. Eales, H. Holland, R and S. Lawler, G. Wilson, T. Morton, Be Mortomore, A. Niblett, E.R. Poyner, M.A. Rankin, S. Robinson, W. Shell, W. Thurrowgood, A. Wilson, T. Goodall, H. Comans, J.E. Fraser.

On the west side of the monument was the following inscription:

"Erected by the residents of the North-West Riding of the Shire of Lillydale in remembrance of the men who enlisted to take part in the great war, 1914-18"

On the east side of the square is a bronze coat of arms bearing the following inscription: "labor omnia vincet" and below are the figures of a horse, and a ram, a plough and a cluster of grapes.

Before the ceremony at 3.30pm, the band played before the arrival of the Governor and the official party which included the Lillydale Shire President Cr Burgi, the chairman of the Memorial Committee Cr Harry Hughes and local member Mr Everard MLA. Rev. T. Tinniswood officiated with the prayers, Thanksgiving and singing of the hymn "Oh God our Help in Ages Past".

After the unveiling, the Governor presented the town with war trophies – one machine gun and two light trench mortars as the soldiers who captured them mostly enlisted from the Lilydale area. The Governor handed over the guns on behalf of the Defence Department.

After the handover the Governor presented a large number of Victory Medals to local soldiers. Following the singing of the National Anthem local school children covered the base of the memorial with wreaths of flowers.

Today, despite attempts by various people and groups, the memorial still holds pride of place in Lilydale. Those who erected it wanted everyone to never forget the sacrifices made by the men and women of our district.

## President's Report 2015-2016

The past 12 months have been very a very busy time for our society and its members on many different fronts.

It is said that only from adversity do you find strength and that was the case with our society this year. When we were seemingly at our lowest ebb during the licence agreement negotiations, everyone rallied around.

Negotiations started in August but weren't finalised until May this year.

The shire had its policies for licencing its buildings but failed to recognise the uniqueness of the court house building – the only building of its kind in this shire.

The result of the changes for us was the costs of being in the building were going from about \$1200 a year to more than \$3,000 to cover 75% of all operating costs such as gas, electricity and water.

Two silent protests at council meetings; countless emails and massive public support from other societies including the RHSV and the national Federation of Historical Societies, finally made an impression on the council.

The range of suggestions the society put forward to minimise utility costs was accepted as were security issues. These will be implemented this year. Also as the society uses the building the same number of hours as U3A we now pay 50 per cent each of all on-costs.

## Other projects

Our headstones project was completed and launched and we started on the ANZACS project.

The response for the ANZACS project was amazing with a team of about 12 people working solidly on it for almost 12 months.

After an initial training workshop, under the coordinator by Jeanette Dodson, members set about researching the service records and personal stories of almost 400 servicemen and women in our collection area.

For everyone involved it became a personal project wanting to make sure Our Boys received the recognition they deserved. This project will be completed in August and an exhibition launched in November.

## **Passing of members**

Sadly in the last 12 months the society lost two of its valuable members. In August members attended the funeral of Life Member Dot Hill. Dot's business acumen and her work on our committee was priceless and is sadly missed.

Brenda Crawshaw was another long-time member who always attended our talks and Christmas parties and helped whenever her busy schedule allowed.

#### Remembered

Last year we lost Val Sheehan and John Brown was invited to speak on our behalf at the unveiling in April of a memorial stone at the Margaret Lewis Reserve at Coldstream by the Friends of Margaret Lewis Reserve.

## Life Membership

Since our inception in 1971, the society has given Life Memberships to many members all of whom have made a very valuable contribution to our work in various ways.

This year, Life Membership was presented to Jim Sawyer. Jim joined the society in our foundation year – 1971 – when he was a councillor of the Riding of the Shire of Lillydale. His support since that time has been invaluable and appreciated by the society.

## Members recognised

Several society members have received much deserved recognition this year. In December, Tony Smith the federal member for Casey presented Evelyn Tull and Phil Burton with Casey Community Volunteer Awards at a special morning.

Recently, the Royal Historical Society awarded me an Award of Merit which will be officially presented later this year.

## **Society Recognition**

In the annual Victorian Community History Awards announced in October, the society received two Commendations. In the Multimedia History Award we entered our Stories Behind the Headstones project.

## Research

Our research requests from people both locally and internationally continued this year. Two to three inquiries each week. Two of the larger projects were for Cave Hill and Chirnside Park Shopping Centre.

## **Community partnerships**

-The society continues to develop its walks and talks with community organisations and members are now training to help with this growing part of our work.

-In August we joined forced with the Australian Institute of Genealogical Studies to stage our first family history weekend - Where Do I Come From? during August as part of National Family History Month. It was a great success and attracted people from all parts of Melbourne. This will be held again next year and be combined into one day.

- With the Lilydale Primary School celebrating its 150th birthday, the society will be mounting a special display to make this very special occasion.
- As part of its mentor program the scholars from the Melba Opera Trust made a Melba Pilgrimage and spent

time with our own John Brown at Melba's grave learning about the diva's life and the significance of the design of her grave.

## **Donations**

Through our website the society has received some valuable donations.

The Celotti family donated scans of a collection of images taken during their time as gardeners at Coombe Cottage in the 1930s.

Lilydale Primary School has donated more than 700 scanned images to the society for safe keeping.

The Oliver family allowed us to scan their family photos which span three generations who lived and worked in Lilydale.

Alan West from Ballarat found some early Mitchell images in his family album and was happy to let us scan them. With a little research we have now established the photo date from the 1870s in Melbourne.

Early photos of the Deschamp family were found in Western Australia and kindly donated to our society.

#### **Talks**

Lorraine Smith organised several successful talks during the year and all were well attended. Details will be published in her annual report.

## Cataloguing

With the handing over of Sandy's photo albums and other memorabilia members have been busy cataloguing these and also indexing our archive files to make accessing them much easier.

#### **Volunteers**

The volunteers are the backbone of our society and provide an assistance which cannot be easily quantified. While professionals are judged on their skills and pay packets our volunteers cost nothing but bring with them the skills they have learned while working and also bring a love of history and helping. The qualifications of our members is amazing and we are so pleased they are sharing them with us.

Finally, I must thank our committee which has worked so hard this year and achieved so much. I might be president but it is the committee and the members working for the society that make our society operate so well.

Thank you are just two words which seem so inadequate for all the work, effort and support members have given this last 12 months, but to me they say it all.
